Preparing and Documenting Environmental Impact Analyses

February 17-19, 2010

Tuition: \$925 (or \$975 to include half-day Writing Module) on or before January 27, 2010 (\$1000/\$1050 after January 27, 2010).

This course, designed for professionals with experience in NEPA work, teaches participants how to prepare, coordinate, and review high-quality documents for decision-makers and the public. The course spans NEPA's fundamental precepts and regulations and the nuts-and bolts of creating high-quality documents in the real world. Extensive practical exercises, in individual and work group format, are included and are designed to give the students hands-on experience. An optional half-day Writing Module session is also offered for a small tuition fee.

Considering Greenhouse Gas Emissions and Climate Change under NEPA

March 3-5, 2010

Tuition: \$800 on or before February 10, 2010 (\$875 after February 10, 2010)

This course details the science of global warming; the expected environmental, social and economic effects of climate change and examine how the NEPA process can be used to assess the impact of a project and its contribution to climate change. It reviews the case law thus far and detail the requirements of current and emerging legislation and how agencies can integrate the new expectations of the courts, the Congress and the public into their analyses

Implementation of the National Environmental Policy Act

March 15-19, 2010

Tuition: \$1250 on or before February 22, 2010 (\$1325 after February 22, 2010)

This popular course is designed for mid-level and senior project managers who work to streamline the environmental permitting process for federal facilities and federal regulatory activities; and to prepare and review environmental assessments, environmental impact statements, and other NEPA analyses. It is a required course of the NEPA Certificate Program.

Scoping, Public Involvement and Environmental Justice

March 29-31, 2010

Tuition: \$925 on or before March 8, 2010 (\$1000 after March 8, 2010)

This course introduces scoping as an analytical exercise that targets key issues. It is the first step in the NEPA process where a manager can be successful at making the process cost less, count more in decision-making and ensure that the public participates in the process. Through a combination of presentation, case studies, role plays and activities, participants will learn the skills necessary to develop a scoping effort that produces meaningful analyses, saves their agency/client money and ensures full public participation in decision-making.

The Law of NEPA

June 2-4, 2010

Tuition: \$925 on or before May 12, 2010 (\$1000 after May 12, 2010)

This course is designed for both non-lawyers and lawyers who want to develop a deeper understanding of the law of NEPA and the workings of our courts. Participants will examine the statute, the CEQ regulations and its guidance memoranda, agency regulations, and the case law.

Implementation of the National Environmental Policy Act

July 26-30, 2010

Tuition: \$1250 on or before July 5, 2010 (\$1325 after July 5, 2010)

This popular course is designed for mid-level and senior project managers who work to streamline the environmental permitting process for federal facilities and federal regulatory activities; and to prepare and review environmental assessments, environmental impact statements, and other NEPA analyses. It is a required course of the NEPA Certificate Program.

Accounting for Cumulative Effects in the NEPA Process

September 15-17, 2010

Tuition: \$925 on or before August 25, 2010 (\$1000 after August 25, 2010)

This intensive course reviews cumulative effects concepts and principles, scoping techniques, baseline conditions and information sources and methods for effects identification and prediction. Examples of cumulative effects analysis with possible appropriate responses are presented. Note** Implementation of NEPA course or equivalent NEPA experience required to take this course.

Tribal Consultation

September 29-October 1, 2010

Tuition: \$925 on or before September 8, 2010 (\$1000 after September 8, 2010)

This course is designed for federal and tribal agency officials who want to develop a greater understanding and awareness of the unique legal relationship the U.S. government has with federally recognized Indian tribes. This course will examine the historical and legal underpinnings of the government-to-government relationship between the U.S. government and Indian tribes. The course will also clarify the consultation responsibilities that are imposed on federal agencies when they undertake activities that may affect Indian rights or interests, or trust resources. The course is designed to assist federal agency officials in building a more effective day-to-day working relationship with federally recognized Indian tribes and Indian communities and will provide practical tips and suggestions for working with Indian tribes.

Implementation of the National Environmental Policy Act

November 8-12, 2010

Tuition: \$1250 on or before October 18, 2010 (\$1325 after October 18, 2010)

This popular course is designed for mid-level and senior project managers who work to streamline the environmental permitting process for federal facilities and federal regulatory activities; and to prepare and review environmental assessments, environmental impact statements, and other NEPA analyses. It is a required course of the NEPA Certificate Program.

Socioeconomic Impact Analysis Under NEPA

December 8-10, 2010

Tuition: \$925 on or before November 17, 2010 (\$1000 after November 17, 2010)

This course addresses the need and legal mandate for socioeconomic impact assessment, which includes the National Environmental Policy Act, the Executive Order on Environmental Justice, and case law. It will address the role that human communities play in responding to, adapting to, and resisting change brought on by major federal actions.

Certificate in the National Environmental Policy Act

Requirements:

A minimum of 100 hours of NEPA instruction taught by Duke University including “Implementation of the National Environmental Policy Act” course, three elective courses within the categories below and a capstone paper.

Required course: Implementation of the National Environmental Policy Act

Elective courses:

Take TWO of the following courses:

- Socioeconomic Impact Analysis under NEPA
- Accounting for Cumulative Effects in the NEPA Process
- Tribal Consultation

And ONE of the following courses:

- Scoping, Public Involvement and Environmental Justice
- Current and Emerging Issues in Environmental Policy
- Preparing and Documenting Environmental Impact Analyses
- The Law of NEPA
- Considering Greenhouse Gas Emissions and Climate Change under NEPA

Capstone Paper:

The capstone paper is an original, research-based culminating exercise related to NEPA theory or practice. The paper should be based on what you have learned in the courses and your current or future work in the field; case study examples are encouraged. The rationale of the capstone paper is two-fold: to demonstrate knowledge of the subject, and to make a contribution to the field. Exemplary papers may be incorporated into future course offerings. The final paper is expected to be 10-20 pages in length, not to exceed 20 pages. The paper will be reviewed by a panel of experts in NEPA. Topics must be approved in advance. To submit a capstone paper proposal, you must have completed at least three required courses and be registered for your fourth.
